Neighborhood Watch: How to form one!

 Captain Vicki Stuckey, Altadena Sheriff's Station What is a Neighborhood Watch? "Neighborhood Watch, Block Watch, Building Watch, Crime Watch"

•Whatever the name, it's one of the most effective and least costly ways to prevent crime and reduce fear.

 Neighborhood Watch fights the isolation that crime creates and feeds upon

 It forges bonds among area residents, helps reduce burglaries and robberies, and improves relations between law enforcement and the communities we serve

Why Neighborhood Watch?

- It works. Throughout the country, decreases in burglary and related offenses are reported by law enforcement professionals in communities with active Neighborhood Programs.
- Today's transient society produces communities that are less personal. Many families have two working parents and children are involved in many activities that keep them away from home. An empty house in a neighborhood where none of the neighbors know the owner is a primary target for a burglary.
- Neighborhood Watch also helps build pride and serves as a springboard for efforts that address other community concerns such as recreation for youth, child care, and affordable housing.

How does a Neighborhood Watch Start? (1 of 2)

- Recruit and Organize as many neighbors as possible
- Contact your local law enforcement agency and invite them to your scheduled meeting. Ensure this meeting is at a time that is most convenient for a majority of neighbors. It is very important that we collaborate with one another. At this meeting you be able to gauge the neighbors' interest, purpose of the program, and identify issues that need to be addressed
- Ask for block captain volunteers who are trustworthy and responsible for relaying information to the members.

How does a Neighborhood Watch Start? (2 of 2)

- Create a communication plan. It is important to decide what type of communication will work for the neighborhood group – meetings or social media or both. Let's not forget, not all neighbors are computer savvy and please do not leave them out when communicating.
- Recruit members, keeping up-to-date information on new residents and making special efforts to involve the elderly, working parents, and young people
- Take action to hold regular meetings (monthly, quarterly, mid-year, etc.). At the meeting have an agenda and a topic to discuss. Consider having a yearly event, e.g. Summer Block Party, Summer Swim Party, Fall Festival, Halloween Haunt, Christmas Gathering. If you think of an event and it involves food, neighbors will come.

Who Can Be Involved?

 Any community resident can join – young and old, single and married, renter and homeowner. Even the busiest of people can belong to a Neighborhood Watch – they too can keep an eye out for neighbors as they come and go. "I Live In An Apartment Building, Can I Start a Neighborhood Watch?"

Yes!

 Neighborhood Watch can be formed around any geographical unit: a block, apartment building, townhouse complex, park, business area, public housing complex, or marina.

What Does A Neighborhood Watch Do?

- Neighbors helping neighbors.
- They are the extra eyes and ears for reporting crime and helping neighbors.
- Members meet their neighbors, learn how to make their homes more secure, watch out for each other and the neighborhood, and report activity that raises suspicions to law enforcement.

What Are the Major Components of A Watch Program?


- Community meeting.
 - These should be set up on a regular basis such as bi-monthly, monthly, or six times a year.
- Communications.
 - These can be as simple as weekly flier/email with community announcements, newsletter that updates neighbors on the progress of projects

What Are My Responsibilities As A Watch Member?

- Be alert!
- Know your neighbors and watch out for each other.
- Report suspicious activities and crimes to your local law enforcement.






