

Plan to Be Safe in/after an Earthquake

- Create a disaster plan; plan a meetup for your family
- Decide how to communicate in an emergency



Seven Steps To Earthquake Safety

1. Secure Your Space 2. Plan To Be Safe

3. Organize **Supplies**

4. Minimize Financial Hardship









5. Drop, Cover, and Hold On


6. Improve Safety

7. Reconnect and Restore



Wall Hangings

- No glass above beds
- Use closed hooks








TVs and Electronics



Straps and buckles secured with adhesive and bolted to anchor points





Water Heaters and Large Appliances





 Secure large appliances to wall studs

Organize Disaster Supplies

- At home, work, and in your car
- Copies of prescriptions, extra glasses, etc.
- Essentials for 3 days, ideally 2 weeks



Supplies for Specific Needs:

- Hearing aid batteries
- Eye glasses
- Walking stick
- Oxygen or nebulizer supplies
- Blood glucose

- Catheter supplies
- Feeding equipment
- Hygiene Supplies
- Soothers/calmers

Right After an Earthquake

- Dress appropriately Shoes!
- See to family members
- Extinguish small fires.
- Clean up spills.
- Inspect home for damage.
- Help neighbors.
- Tune to Emergency Alert System
- Expect aftershocks.

Wildfire Myths

- It Won't Happen Here
- It won't happen to me
- It won't be that bad
- I won't have to evacuate
- The Fire Department will help me
- I'll leave when my neighbor goes
- I'll wait til the last minute

Prepare Ahead of Time

Because it will happen to you

- 1. Stay alert and watch the news
- 2. Turn the cars around and get them ready
- 3. Pre-evacuate load up the cars now. Do you have more cars than drivers?
- 4. Grab-and-go bags
- 5. Evacuate early don't wait to be told
- 6. Most human fire deaths because people wait to long to leave
- 7. Fires can move at 45+ mph
- 8. If you are asked to get out, leave immediately
- 9. Lock up the house, leave the lights on, move flammables away from the windows
- 10. Don't become a victim, because it can happen to you!

If You Can't Escape

- Stuff wet cloth around doors and vents.
- Call the fire department.
- Stay low and by a window.
- Open windows (that are not exposed to smoke) at top and bottom.
- Wave a bright-colored cloth at the window.

WHAT SHOULD BE IN A PET EVACUATION KIT?



PET TIPS FOR EMERGENCIES

Know your pet's favorite hiding spots so you can evacuate them quickly and safely.

Keep a pet carrier or crate for each pet you have and ensure they're easily accessible for transporting pets safely.

Have an emergency budget set aside to help with any unexpected pet expenses.

- Research pet-friendly hotels in the area in case you need to leave home.
- Place emergency stickers on your windows and doors to help notify first responders that pets are inside.
- In your Disaster Pet Supply Kit, have your contact information and pet medical records laminated for protection from the weather.

BY THE NUMBERS

- In 2020, there were 6,516 pedestrians killed in traffic crashes.
- On average, a pedestrian died every 81 minutes in 2020.

Safety Tips for Drivers

Look for Pedestrians Everywhere!

- Pedestrians may be walking in unexpected areas, or may be hard to see – especially at night, in poorly lit areas, or in bad weather.
- Always stop or yield for pedestrians in the crosswalk_

School Zones & Neighborhoods

- Stay alert where children may be present.
- Never pass vehicles stopped at crosswalks. They might be stopped to allow pedestrians to cross the street.

Survivability

- Slow down and carefully adhere to posted speed limits.
- Lower speeds are one of the most important factors in pedestrian crash survivability.

Safety Tips for Pedestrians

Where To Walk

- Walk on sidewalk or path. If neither is available, walk facing traffic and as far from cars as possible.
- Cross streets at marked crosswalks or intersections whenever possible; this is where drivers expect pedestrians
- AB 2147, (The Freedom To Walk Act)

Be Alert

- Walkers wearing headphones or using a cell phone might not hear a car horn, or could miss a traffic signal at a crosswalk.
- Walking while impaired is dangerous. Approximately 47% of fatal pedestrian crashes in 2020 involved a pedestrian who was drunk.

Assumptions

- Never assume drivers see you; they could be distracted or impaired.
- Try to make eye contact with drivers.
- Make yourself visible by wearing brightly colored clothing during the day. At night, wear reflective materials, or use a flashlight.

- 1. Make you aware of recent fatal collisions that have occurred in Altadena.
- Alert you of a motion that the Board of Supervisors passed on January 10, 2023 regarding traffic safety in Altadena.
 - a. Provide information regarding Public Works' response to the Board motion.
 - b. Provide information on how you can submit feedback.
- 3. Provide background on traffic safety efforts in the County and Altadena.
- 4. Present collision statistics and trends.



January 10, 2023 Board Motion Directives

I, THEREFORE MOVE that the Board of Supervisors (Board) direct the Department of Public Works to:

- Evaluate traffic safety conditions on the roadway corridor on Holliston Avenue between Altadena Drive and New York Drive and consider appropriate traffic safety enhancements;
- Evaluate traffic safety conditions on the roadway corridor on Fair Oaks Avenue between Loma Alta Drive and Altadena Drive and consider appropriate traffic enhancements;
- 3. Engage with the Altadena Town Council and the community to discuss data and trends related to traffic collisions and fatalities in the Altadena community; and
- 4. Report back to the Board in writing in 45 days.



Vision Zero – LA County




NOVEMBER 2019


Collision Concentration Corridors

Fatal & Severe Injury Crashes – Unincorporated Los Angeles County





Fatal & Severe Injury Crashes – Altadena





Midblock Sideswipe	2	0	3%
Miscellaneous (Bicycle)	6	0	8%
Miscellaneous (Non-Bike or Animal)	2	0	3%

Potential Traffic Safety Enhancements

- High-visibility crosswalks
- Leading Pedestrian Intervals (LPI)
- Paint and bollard curb extensions
- Speed cushions
- Rectangular Rapid-Flashing
 Beacons
- Reflective stop sign markings
- Reflective traffic signal backplates



Board Motion Response

Potential Quick build Traffic Safety Enhancements

Fair Oaks Avenue – Loma Alta Drive to Altadena Drive

- Add reflective centerline raised markers and edge line striping
- Evaluate feasibility of installing continental crosswalks with edge line delineation at existing stop controls
- Update existing uncontrolled marked crosswalks and signing
- Evaluate existing signal for quick upgrades and long-term improvements
- Repaint existing red curbs and add additional red curbs near curb returns
- Add double yellow centerline striping at intersection approaches



Board Motion Response

Potential Quick build Traffic Safety Enhancements (Continued)

Holliston Avenue – Altadena Drive to New York Drive

- Altadena Drive to Mendocino Street Add centerline with reflective raised markers and edge line striping.
- Mendocino Street to New York Drive Present to the community the option of restricting parking on the east side to add centerline with reflective raised markers and edge line striping.
- Evaluate feasibility of installing continental crosswalks with edge line delineation at existing stop controls
- Repaint existing red curbs and add additional red curbs near curb returns
- Add double yellow centerline striping at intersection approaches

- Develop recommendations for traffic safety improvements based on evaluation and feedback received.
- Attend next Town Council Meeting to inform Altadena Community at large of our efforts.
